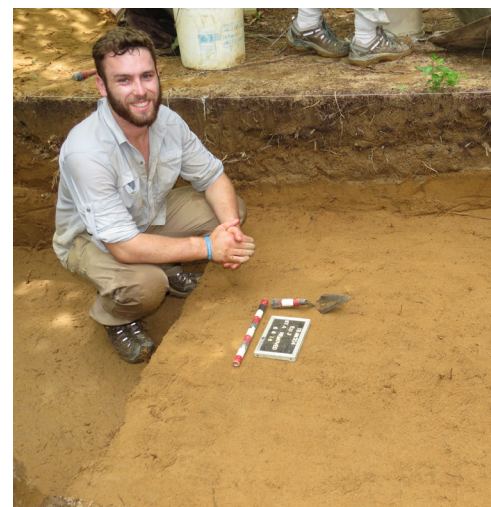


2019 WASHINGTON COLLEGE ARCHAEOLOGY FIELD SCHOOL

Jug Bay Wetlands Sactuary (May 20-June 14): In partnership with the Lost Towns Project, Inc., students will conduct survey and excavation at several sites in the Jug Bay Wetlands Sanctuary on the Patuxent River to document the effects of climate change, erosion, and human activity on 10,000 years of human occupation.

Andelot Farm, Kent County (June 17-July 12): Students will shift their efforts to the Eastern Shore where they will conduct investigations at an early colonial plantation site in Kent Co. known as Andelot Farm (1680-1720). Dating to the early English settlement of Kent Co., the remains reflect shifts in culture and fascinating adaptations to a new environment.

Students are required to enroll in both
4 week sections of the field school,
registering for both
ANT 296-10 & 296-20.

Tuition is \$3,500 and includes housing for
both sites. Students are responsible for
their meals.
