Name: Irene Lemos

Title: Professor of Classical Archaeology, Fellow of Merton College

Affiliation: University of Oxford

Irene Lemos is a leading expert in the archaeology of Late Bronze Age and Early Iron Age Greece. She has been the author or (co-)editor of nine monographs on the topic (one of which award-winning), and she has been directing the excavations at Lefkandi since 2003. In addition to her prolific research, Professor Lemos has supervised an exceptionally high number of Ph.D. dissertations on early Greece and the Mediterranean. She is a corresponding member of the German Archaeological Institute, and a fellow of the Society of Antiquaries of London. She was the AIA Kress Lecturer and the Australian Archaeological Institute at Athens Professorial Research Fellow in 2014.

Dr. Leonardo López Luján is a leading expert in the archaeology of Mexico and director of the Templo Mayor Project at the Aztec capital of Tenochtitlán, now Mexico City. He holds a Ph.D. from Paris Nanterre University. López Luján is an international honorary member of the American Academy of Arts and Sciences; a member of the Academia Mexicana de Ciencias, the Academia Mexicana de la Historia, and El Colegio Nacional; and a correspondent member of the British Academy, the Society of Antiquaries of London, the Real Academia de la Historia (Spain), and the Académie des Inscriptions et Belles-Lettres (France). He has authored or co-authored twenty-one books and essays and edited or co-edited twenty-two volumes and received many awards, fellowships, and visiting positions from prestigious institutions around the world. His election as a Corresponding Member would expand the AIA's expertise in Latin American archaeology.

Name: Petranka Nedelcheva

Dr. Petranka Nedelcheva is currently Head of Exhibitions and the International Department at the National Museum of History in Sofia, Bulgaria. She also is Assistant Senior Professor in the Department of Archaeology at the New Bulgarian University. Dr. Nedelcheva received her Ph.D. in the Department of Archaeology at New Bulgarian University in 2012. She came to the Field Museum of Natural History in 2013 as a Postdoctoral Fellow funded by the America for Bulgaria Foundation. Dr. Nedelcheva is a

specialist in the analysis of chipped stone tools, and has extensive analytical and field work experience at sites throughout the Balkans, as well as in Turkey, Oman, and Georgia. The author of two monographs and dozens of articles, Dr. Nedelcheva is known throughout southeastern Europe as one of the most skilled lithic analysts in the region. Most recently, she has been critical in bringing the First Kings of Europe exhibition to North America.

Henry Tantaleán (Ph.D-Barcelona) is a distinguished Peruvian archaeologist known for his extensive research on the ancient civilizations of Peru, particularly the Moche, Paracas, and Pukara cultures. He has conducted extensive fieldwork throughout the Andes. He is currently a full Professor in his department and Director of the Museum of Archaeology in the University. His publication record is truly impressive. He is without doubt one of the most distinguished archaeologists in South America with an international reputation. He published *Peruvian Archaeology: A Critical History* (Routledge), *The Ancient Andean States* (Routledge), and edited the volume *Andean Ontologies: New Archaeological Perspectives* (Florida).

Natalia Vogeikoff is an outstanding scholar who has contributed to our understanding of the history of American archaeology in Greece through her entirely original blog, nataliavogeikoff.com, The Archivist's Notebook, now in its 10th year. Her interests have also led her to study the career of Carl W. Blegen, the AIA's first Gold Medal award winner (1965), and to bring greater attention to a reexamination of the phenomenon of American philhellenism. Most recently she has organized outstanding exhibitions in Athens, one currently focused on women refugees and the refugee crisis provoked in 1922 by the Lausanne Treaty. All the preceding is over and beyond her exemplary fieldwork regarding Hellenistic Crete, and her role each year in teaching American students at the ASCSA about Crete.

Panagiotis (Takis) Karkanias is one of the world's most distinguished geoarchaeologists. For more than 20 years, Karkanias served as a senior geologist in the Ephorate of Palaeoanthropology-Speleology in the

Antiquities Service of Greece; since, he has directed the Weiner Laboratory for nearly a decade, spurring and supporting the growth of archaeological science in Greece. Beyond Greece, he has worked in South Africa, China, Israel, France, Spain, Hungary, Albania, and Cyprus. In 2018, he was recognized as an International Member of the US National Academy of Sciences and is also an International Member of the American Academy of Arts and Sciences.
